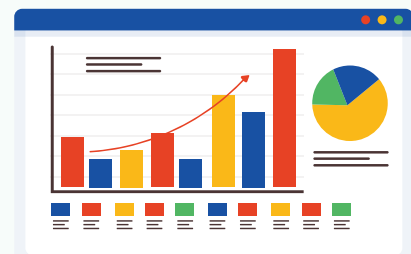

Once you have a baseline, you can use the DST to measure progress as learners move through their course. As an objective assessment based on CEFR descriptors, it ensures no student is left behind.



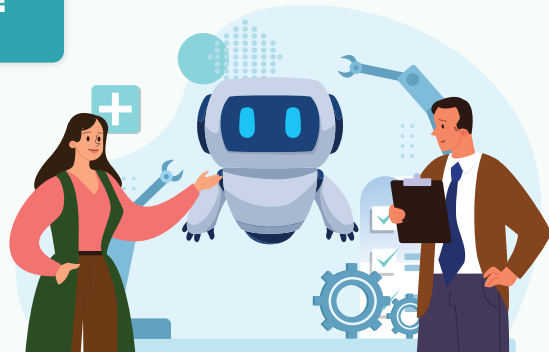
High-stakes test prep

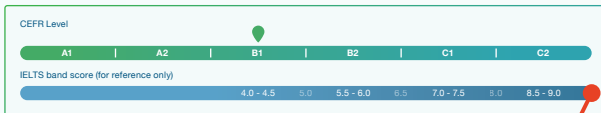


Why the Dynamic Speaking Test?
